Item Summary:

The river bank on the golf course near holes 10, 11 and 12 experienced bank erosion from Hurricane Harvey. The presentation by Freese and Nichols, Inc. will update Council on the damages, FEMA's portion of the project, and options moving forward.

Background Information:

The City of Freeport is working with FEMA to complete repairs at several locations damaged during Hurricane Harvey. This project in particular is for river bank erosion that will require coordination with the Army Corps of Engineers and the General Land Office.

Financial Impact:

FEMA has estimated the total project cost for this project to be \$228,888.00. Of that, the Federal Share (90%) is \$205,999.20 and the City's portion (10%) is \$22.888.80. This does not account for engineering fees which are estimated to be capped at 15% (or \$34,333) with the same proportional split. Overall, the City could receive up to \$236,898 for these repairs.

Management Summary

In accordance with the City's Investment Policy, the Investment Officer shall prepare an investment report at least quarterly, including a management summary that provides an analysis of the status of the current investment portfolio and transactions made over the last quarter. This management summary is prepared in a manner consistent with the requirements of Section 2256.023 of the PFIA which should allow the City to ascertain whether investment activities during the reporting period have conformed to the investment policy.

The City invests cash that is not immediately needed for operations in TexPool and Securities issued by Agencies of the Federal Government as allowed by the Public Funds Investment Act and the City's Investment Policy.

As of September 30, 2020, the City's cash and investments were as follows:

The portfolio is highly liquid with over \$16.3 million or 100% available immediately.

Interest rates on investments range from 0.13% to 0.5%. According to the Federal Reserve, nominal interest rates are low in the United States and other advanced economies. Low nominal interest rates may constrain the ability of policymakers to provide accommodation through reductions in interest rates during an economic downturn.

Additionally, a new debt service account was added for compliance with the bond proceeds.

<u>Compliance</u>: The City requires its depository banks to provide collateral for all deposits in excess of Federal Deposit Insurance. As of September 30, 2020, the market value of collateral pledged by TIB Capital Markets to the City was \$12.16 million, 120% of deposits.

<u>Market Value</u>: The City currently holds no investments in which the book value differs from the market value. For all holdings, the book value is equal to the market value.

The City requires its depository banks to provide collateral for all deposits in excess of Federal Deposit Insurance. At the end of the quarter, the market value of collateral pledged by Baker Bond Accounting to the City was \$12.16M, 120% of deposits.

Unrealized gain/loss is the difference between the market value of the City's securities and what it paid for them. Gains and losses are realized only when a security is sold prior to maturity. Since it is the City's practice to hold all securities to maturity, it is unlikely that unrealized gains and losses will be realized. As of the end of the quarter, the City had no unrealized gains or losses.

Call to order.

Mayor Bass called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Invocation was led by City Manager Tim Kelty. Pledge was led by Mayor Brooks Bass.

Citizen's Comments

Manning Rollerson spoke to council about Christianity. He said that the church in The East End of Freeport was sold, and the money will be donated to a nonprofit organization.

PRESENTATIONS/ANNOUNCEMENTS: Announcements by Mayor, City Council and/or Staff.

Employee of the month for the months of February & September 2020.

Freeport Fire/EMS employee Kris Vierra was presented with a certificate recognizing him for Employee of the Month, for the month of February 2020.

Freeport Police Sargent John Perez was presented with a certificate recognizing him for Employee of the Month, for the month of September 2020.

CONSENT AGENDA

Consideration and possible action on the approval of City Council meeting minutes from September, 28 2020 and October 5, 2020.

On a motion by Councilwoman Loeza, seconded by Councilman Yates, with all present voting "Aye" 5-0 Council approved City Council meeting minutes from September, 28 2020 and October 5, 2020.

Consideration and possible action by City Council approving the sale of trust property within the city limits.

City Manager Tim Kelty said that this property is privately owned and is going up for Sheriff Sale. He said the city has interest in the property for back taxes.

On a motion by Councilwoman Loeza, seconded by Councilman Yates, with all present voting "Aye" 5-0 Council unanimously approved the sale of trust property within the city limits.

Consideration and possible action approving Interlocal Agreement with Brazoria County and the City of Freeport for streets and alleys.

City Manager Tim Kelty said that the county does the asphalt reconstruction of the streets that the city designates. The city covers the cost of materials, and the County provides labor and the equipment.

Councilwoman Loeza asked why just two miles a year of repair on the roads? City Manager Tim Kelty said that this is the amount the county will commit to doing, this is the amount that they can do with their resources that they have available.

Eric Hayes asked if these roads are going to be repaired with concrete, or asphalt? And will the curbs and gutters be done before the repairs?

Tim Kelty said that the streets have not been designated yet, but the County contract only includes asphalt. He said that any curb and gutters would have to be completed prior to the work is done.

On a motion by Councilwoman Loeza, seconded by Councilman Yates, with all present voting "Aye" 5-0 Council unanimously approved the Interlocal Agreement with Brazoria County and the City of Freeport for streets and alleys.

REGULAR SESSION

Consideration and possible approval for award of proposal for the comprehensive Zoning Ordinance Overhaul.

City Manager Tim Kelty presented to council the award of proposal for the comprehensive Zoning Ordinance Overhaul. He said that this has been presented to council three times. Mr. Kelty said that the time frame has been shortened, because this was a concern for council. He also said that the price was an issue, so they have gone back to Kendig Keast. He said that if we go with just the zoning ordinance it will be \$76,790. Mr. Kelty said that staff recommends the full scope of work, but if not, then the zoning ordinance is the highest priority.

Manning Rollerson said that he thinks the East End of Freeport needs to be re-zoned.

Nicole Mireles asked if software has been looked into for this project. She also said that Planning and Zoning needs to be given a chance at this project.

Mayor Bass asked if Incode Plus is included in this, and does this reference the operating system?

Mr. Kelty said that Incode Plus does not create the ordinance, it just a tool to use to implement during this process.

Angie Williams opposes this.

On a motion by Councilwoman Loeza, seconded by Councilman Green, with all present voting "Aye" 3-2 Council approved the award of proposal for the comprehensive Zoning Ordinance Overhaul, in the entirety for the \$102,450.00. Mayor Bass and Councilman Yates voted "Ney"

Consideration and possible action on designating a representative and an alternate to the Houston-Galveston Area Council General Assembly for the year 2021.

City Manager Tim Kelty presented to council the action on designating a representative and an alternate to the Houston-Galveston Area Council General Assembly for the year 2021. He said that this group meets twice a year. Mr. Kelty said that in the past Councilman Green served as the representative, and Councilwoman Loeza as the alternate.

Mayor Bass asked Councilman Green if he would like to continue to serve? Councilman Green said yes.

Mayor Bass asked Councilwoman Loeza if she would like to continue to serve? Councilwoman Loeza said yes.

On a motion by Councilman Cain, seconded by Councilman Yates, with all present voting "Aye" 5-0 Council unanimously approved action on designating a representative and an alternate to the Houston-Galveston Area Council General Assembly for the year 2021.

Consideration and possible action on Resolution No. 2020-2663 appointing a new member to the Freeport EDC Board replacing Kenny Hayes.

City Manager Tim Kelty presented to council Resolution No. 2020-2663 appointing a new member to the Freeport EDC Board replacing Kenny Hayes. He said that this term would be until June of 2021. He said that there are seven applicants interested in serving the remainder of this term.

Marinell Music said that she recommends David McGinty to serve on this board.

Jeff Pena said that he hopes that council will consider appointing someone that has the time and flexibility to serve on this board.

Keith Stumbaugh said that he is withdrawing his application from consideration at this time to serve on the EDC Board.

Melanie Oldham said that she has an interest to serve on this board, and asked that council consider her for this vacancy.

David McGinty spoke of his interest of serving on the EDC Board.

Edmeryl Williams spoke on behalf of Joshua Mitchell for serving on the EDC Board. She said that she would love to see the city involve young people on the boards.

On a motion by Councilman Green to appoint Nicole Mireles, seconded by Councilman Yates, with all present voting "Aye" 4-1 Council approved Resolution No. 2020-2663 appointing a new member to the Freeport EDC Board replacing Kenny Hayes. Councilwoman Loeza voted "Ney"

Consideration and possible action authorizing the City Manager to negotiate and execute Professional Services Agreements with Freese and Nichols, Inc. for CDBG-MIT projects.

Assistant City Manager Stephanie Russell presented to council the possible action authorizing the City Manager to negotiate and execute Professional Services Agreements with Freese and Nichols, Inc. for CDBG-MIT projects. She said that council awarded the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to Freese and Nichols back in August, Ms. Russell said however now the application requires that we submit contracts with them.

Mayor Bass asked what the difference is between what was passed last, and what this is tonight. Ms. Russell said that last was awarded the RFQ. Tonight, is requesting that the City Manager to execute the Service Agreement.

On a motion by Councilman Yates, seconded by Councilman Cain, with all present voting "Aye" 5-0 Council unanimously approved action authorizing the City Manager to negotiate and execute Professional Services Agreements with Freese and Nichols, Inc. for CDBG-MIT projects.

Consideration and possible action approving Resolution No. 2020-2656 to Amend the Investment Policy.

Mayor Bass moved Item # 9 to be presented after Item # 10 at the request of Assistant City Manager.

Consideration and possible action approving Resolution No. 2020-2657 authorizing submission of FICA Application and designating signatories

Assistant City Manager presented to council Resolution No. 2020-2657 authorizing submission of FICA Application and designating signatories. Miss Russell said that she would like to put this money in more opportune place. She said that this FICA is one hundred percent secure, and she can withdraw the funds the next day. Ms. Russell said that this is recommended by the city's Financial Advisor.

Mayor Bass announced that the city bonds were approved, and the \$8 million is in our bank.

City Attorney spoke of his concerns of the contract.

Manning Rollerson said that he opposes this.

After a lengthy discussion with council, Mayor Bass tabled Item Numbers 9 & 10 so that council can do a further review.

WORK SESSION:

Mayor Bass said that the city did receive the bond money. He said with this we will start looking into the street and drainage projects. He said that we will be having a meeting on October 26, 2020 at 6 PM.

Councilman Green thanked the Public Works Department on the work that has been done on the streets.

Councilman Cain asked if there is an update on the house that burned on 10th and Velasco. He said that it has been almost a year since the fire. Ms. Russell said that she believes the owners are dealing with the insurance company. Councilman Cain asked if there could be a fence put up around the property. He also said that there are two homes one on 7th Street and Avalon, and the other on 1700 block of West 6th Street, he said that they have swimming pools set up in the front yards with no fences around the pool.

Mayor Bass asked that Mr. Kelty have Freeport Building and Code Director Billy Shoemaker prepare a list and bring to each council meeting of buildings that he has inspected so that we can start seeing some improvement.

Councilwoman Loeza said that there is a pool on 9th Street that has a pool up without a fence around it. She also said that she agrees with Mayor Bass that Mr. Shoemaker needs to bring in a list of things that are being worked on. She asked how often the sidewalks get repaired. Mr. Kelty said that if the sidewalk is reported they will address it, he also said that as the streets are being repaired if the sidewalk needs repair it will be addressed at that time. She asked about a leak possibly a water main. Lance Petty said that Veolia will repair this leak, he said that he will get with Jerry Meeks tomorrow.

Councilman Yates spoke about the Wong Property agreement, he said that from what he understands we are pretty close. He said that he wants to see the projected expenses for the city and the projected income for the city from this project. He also said that businesses are closing. He said that Church's Chicken is back open. He said that he thinks the \$8 million needs to be deposited into our local banks, and come up with a spending plan.

City Manager Tim Kelty said that he would like Lance Petty to recognize the three Public Works employees that have been spraying the city for mosquitos. Lance Petty said that the employees are Paul Neuhaus, John Steig and Jesus Rodriguez.

Mayor Bass called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Invocation was led by City Manager Tim Kelty. Pledge was led by Mayor Brooks Bass.

Citizen's Comments

Edmeryl Williams stated how black churches do not hate the white man and it's not what's in her heart.

Desiree Pearson stated that there is junk in the 200 block of Broad Street and when she stopped to take a picture a dog chased her.

WORK SESSION:

Mayor Bass stated that this special called meeting was intended to discuss and prioritize that bond projects. He stated that council has worked with citizens and staff to determine items that needed maintenance. He stated that council welcomed any sites in the city. He said money has been earmarked for the renovations of City Hall. He stated it was undetermined if any money would be used for the Heritage House.

Manning Rollerson stated that he has lived in Ward A a long time and there are serious drainage issues on the back side of Cherry to Highway 36 and that there are trees growing blocking culverts and culverts that are broken.

City Manager Tim Kelty stated that staff is asking public and City Council for feedback regarding bond projects. He stated that from the budgeted \$7.7 million bond, the following were earmarked: 9% for City Hall renovations, 5% for Heritage House, 3% for Velasco Pump Station and 83% for Streets and Drainage. He said at some point a formal decision will need to be made regarding the Heritage House, and also the Velasco Pump Station has been designed and will be ready to have a contract awarded next month.

Mr. Kelty stated that this meeting to was examine the street and drainage issues in Freeport. He gave council a cost estimate for rehabbing the streets with 3 options: contract asphalt, contract concrete, and the asphalt under the county interlocal agreement. Streets that had been identified would include sidewalks if the road currently had them and are in need of repair. The cost estimated for concrete included a cost for sidewalk. The prices quoted were per square foot. He stated that there were currently three alleys that were being considered for repair on the list. He said the costs were to replace streets and return them to the originally designed elevation.

Councilman Yates stated that it appeared that Ward A was getting the short end of the stick.

Mr. Kelty stated that Ward A is proposed to get approximately 1.14 miles, Ward B to receive 0.96 miles, Ward C to receive 1.6 miles, and Ward D to receive 1.3 miles.

Mr. Kelty stated the mapped streets are just an initial proposal. He said other roads have been mentioned like 2nd Street, Jones Road behind the trailer park and Austin Street over by the Golf Course. Mr. Kelty stated that Public Works Director Lance Petty has had his crews been working to reestablish ditches. We have gotten a list of potential water and sewer lines and crossings that will need to be replaced under the streets prior to the Street reconstruction. A cost for that work has been included but will need to reviewed.

Councilman Yates stated that the handouts needed to be cleaned up and needed titles but he liked the proposed streets list.

Councilman Ken Green stated that he agreed with resident Manning Rollerson regarding people moving out from 8th Street, 9th Street and 10th Street regarding lots of deterioration.

Resident Sam Reyna distributed pictures to council, Tim Kelty and Lance Petty showing conditions of streets on Avenue G, Zapata and Avenue C.

City Councilwoman Sandra Loeza stated that she had turned those streets in to Mr. Kelty.

Mayor Bass stated that these streets need to be addressed.

Mr. Reyna stated that there was a product that was cheaper and easier to install and that Vernor equipment had agreed to purchase the equipment to install if the city chose that product.

Resident Melanie Oldham stated that concrete streets should be considered due to them lasting so long.

Resident Jessi Parker stated that she wondered if the east end streets and park had been sold to the Port as there were no East End Streets discussed.

Mayor Bass stated that nothing in the East End has been sold and there have been a number of streets in the East End that have been repaired recently.

Resident Edmeryl Williams stated that Spruce already had a pot hole in it from the recent repairs. She said that ditches and culverts are stopping water from flowing. She said that there had been work in the 400 block where no one lives and she lives in the 500 block.

Resident Angie Williams stated that Navigation and 5th Street is like a swimming pool and doesn't drain. She also stated that she wished a rental facility similar to Freeport Community House would be built.

Resident Sam Reyna stated that the money from the bond election should be set up for election and doesn't have to be used for specific items.

Mayor Bass stated that we are not under the previous administration and that the public can trust council.

Resident Sam Reyna stated that the city needs to look at TIGER grants for federal funding.

Mayor Bass stated that they are making sound decisions and are looking for outside funding.

Resident Keith Stumbaugh stated that the alleys in Ward A are in very bad shape. He said that in the 400 Block of West 4th near the east side of the railroad track heading east that the concrete slabs are tilted.

Resident Manning Rollerson stated that the he has to snake every home every month in the area of 6^{th} and Cherry because of sewer issues. He added that Terminal needed to be weed-eated.

Resident Jessi Parker stated that there are potholes at the railroad past Sista White's Café that need to be repaired.

Councilwoman Loeza clarified that sidewalks would be repaired with the streets if they needed to be.

Mr. Kelty stated that funding was included in the concrete estimates.

Resident Melanie Oldham questioned why Bridge Harbor is a priority.

Councilman Green stated that it is a very rough road.

Resident Nicole Mireles stated that there are no streets in the Slaughter Road area.

Councilwoman Loeza stated that she had given street information for this area to Mr. Kelty.

Mr. Kelty stated we had looked at slaughter road which was in poor condition but that there were no homes on that proposed side street within our city limits in the only residence was on the end of the street outside of the city of Freeport.

Resident Desiree Pearson stated that Front Street has a subpar street with no sidewalks and no ditches for drainage.

Mayor Bass stated that the repair of the pump station should relieve any drainage concerns.

Resident Mario Maraira stated that in the 1700 block of 5th Street that residents complain that the city is not maintaining the grass around the sidewalk area.

Mayor Bass stated that it is the responsibility of property owners to maintain from the curb to the edge street or alley.

Resident Nicole Mireles requested a paper copy of the map and was provided one.

Item Summary: Freeport Fire & EMS provides fire protection into the unincorporated areas of Brazoria County or to neighboring communities requesting mutual aid. Freeport Fire & EMS Department depends on mutual fire protection to address manpower and equipment needs in fire protection. This agreement is renewed annually with the individual fire department and Brazoria County Firefighter's Association (BCFFA). Each department must meet ten objectives in the contractual agreement to be in compliance of the agreement. As part of compliance the department is compensated \$20,000.00.

Background Information: Fire Chief John A. Stanford, Jr., was involved in the creation of the BCFFA PAC to address fire protection needs in the community. A part of the PAC was to address fire engine replacement owned by Brazoria County. The BCFFA Fire Protection Agreement was created after Brazoria County Commissioners were faced with the replacing at least a dozen fire trucks from 1986. Prior to creating the fire protection agreement Brazoria County provide each fire department a fire engine. With the replacement of a large number of fire engines at one time create a financial challenge. In lieu of a fire truck replacement, Brazoria County Commissioner and BCFFA entered into an agreement by providing an annual payment to participating departments to be used towards fire engine replacement or operational needs.

ORDINANCE NO.2020-2616

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FREEPORT, TEXAS, CONTAINING A PREAMBLE; AMENDING CHAPTER 52 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF SAID CITY TO ADD A DISABLED CITIZENS DISCOUNT FOR WATER AND SEWER AND WATER ONLY SERVICES; CONTAINING SAVINGS CLAUSES; CONTAINING A SEVERANCE CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL TAKE EFFECT AND BE IN FORCE FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE AND ADOPTION.

WHEREAS, the City of Freeport, Texas, ("the City") is a "Home Rule City" and a "Home Rule Municipality" lying and situated in Brazoria County, Texas, as described in and defined by Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas and Section 1.005 of the Local Government Code of Texas, respectively; and,

WHEREAS, Chapter 51 and 402 of the Local Government Code of Texas and Sections 2.01, 2.02, 3.07(n) and (u) of the Home Rule Charter of the City of Freeport authorize the City Council thereof to adopt the provisions of this Ordinance; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Freeport has determined to here now declare that the adoption of this ordinance is necessary to the health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of said City and persons owning land therein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FREEPORT, TEXAS:

First, Section 52.23 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Freeport, Texas, is hereby amended as follows:

"52.23 SENIOR AND DISABLED CITIZENS DISCOUNT

a) Residents 65 and older and disabled citizens shall be eligible to apply for a discount of twenty percent of the base water and sewer rate.

- b) "Disabled Citizen" as used in this section means a person that can show proof of disability upon presentation of one of the following:
 - 1. Certification from the Social Security Administration;
 - 2. Certification from a proper administrative officer that the applicant is a recipient of a public disability pension entity; or
 - 3. Certification from the Veterans Administration"

Second, this ordinance is cumulative of and in addition to all other ordinances of the City of Freeport, Texas, on the same subject and all ordinances are hereby expressly saved from repeal.

Third, where this ordinance and another ordinance conflict or overlap, this ordinance shall prevail.

Fourth, nothing contained in this ordinance shall cause any rights heretofore vested to be altered, affected or impaired in any way and all such rights may be hereafter enforced as if this ordinance had not been adopted.

Fifth, if any section or provision of this ordinance is found to be unconstitutional, void or inoperative by the final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, such defective provision, if any, is hereby declared to be severable from the remaining sections and provisions of this ordinance and such remaining sections and provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

Sixth, this ordinance shall take effect and be in force after its passage and adoption.

Staff recommends approval of proposed CRF Spending Plan.

Item Summary:

The City must submit a plan detailing proposed expenditures for its \$690,580 allocation from the Coronavirus Relief Fund by November 13, 2020. Staff proposes spending this allocation on direct expenses (\$137,076), COVID related payroll (\$473,504), the Brazosport ISD ("BISD") allocation to facilitate remote learning activities (\$50,000) previously approved by Council, and a Utility Grant Program (\$30,000). This spending plan meets the requirements of the program by utilizing over 77% of the expenses on Categories 1, 2, and 3.

This Utility Grant Program is designed to assist Customers negatively impacted by the Pandemic through the loss of income associated with temporary or permanent layoff, furlough or reduction in paid work hours. The proposed allocation for the program is \$30,000 in total and individual applicants can receive a total of \$300.00 per household.

In order to apply for this program residents must complete an application and provide the required documentation. Qualifying applications and awards will be made on a first come, first serve basis by with an application deadline of Monday, November 16th. Due to the sensitive timeframe for reporting, recipients must provide Official Receipt for use of funds by Friday, December 11th.

Background Information:

On May 11, 2020, the state of Texas made an allocation of \$690,580 from the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) available to the City of Freeport. These funds come with a strict expenditure timeline and must be used for COVID-19-related costs incurred by December 30, 2020. However; all documentation for reimbursement must be submitted to TDEM by December 15, 2020.

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act") established the Coronavirus Relief Fund (the "Fund"). The CARES Act provides that payments from the Fund may only be used to cover costs that—

- 1. Are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease
- 2. Were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27 2020 (excluding payroll costs).
- 3. Were incurred between March 1. 2020 and December 30, 2020

Council previously approved a \$50,000 allocation for BISD to facilitate remote learning activities. BISD requested funding from the cities of Freeport, Clute, and Lake Jackson to match up to \$250K for additional wireless hot spots and Chromebooks for students with limited connectivity. This enabled BISD to use this \$500,000 to secure an additional \$500,000 in TEA Funding for this program.

CRF Utility Customer Relief Grant Program

<u>Summary:</u> The City of Freeport has approved the use of up to \$30,000 in CARES Act Relief Fund (CRF) funding for assisting residents negatively impacted by the CoVid 19 Pandemic. The City has capped individual awards for this grant at \$300.00 per household and funds may only be used to pay for Utility Bills for the address at which the applicant resides. Applicants must meet the necessary qualifications, complete the form below and include the information required as listed. Qualifying applications and awards will be made on a first come, first serve basis and must be submitted no later than Monday, November 16, 2020. Only one application may be made per household and the applicant must reside at that address.

Program Qualification: In order to qualify for award under this program the applicant(s) must:

- Own, rent or maintain their primary household within the City Limits of the City of Freeport, Texas and provide proof thereof in the form of a Lease, Tax Statement or other official document (voter registration, Driver's License or City Utility Bill in the applicants name listing residence).
- Be able to show negative economic impact resulting from layoff, furlough or loss of paid work hours beginning after March 19, 2020 as a result of the CoVid 19 Pandemic. The City will accept letters from employers, documentation from the Texas Workforce Commission or Sworn, Notarized Affidavits from the applicant.
- Provide a copy of their most recent Utility Billing statement. If applicant's account is delinquent or in arrears on their account, they must agree in writing to enter into a repayment program and provide proof thereof.

<u>Program Provisions:</u> In addition to the Qualifications listed above, the following provisions shall apply:

- Funds received under this program may only be used to pay for an existing and active Utility account with the City of Freeport, Center Point Energy or Retail Electric Provider.
- Funds MAY NOT be used to pay for telecommunications connection of any kind.
- On award, the City shall disburse funds via check to the Awardee. Those funds must be expended by <u>Friday</u>, <u>December 4th</u> and the Awardee must provide the City with an <u>Official Receipt for those funds by Friday</u>, <u>December 11th</u>. Failure to provide an Official Receipt within this time period will result in a forfeit of the Award, triggering immediate repayment of the full amount of Award the City and potentially termination of service.
- Further, Applicants shall agree to cooperate and provide requested documentation in the event of programmatic audit.

Coronavirus Relief Fund Guidance for State, Territorial, Local, and Tribal Governments April 22, 2020

The purpose of this document is to provide guidance to recipients of the funding available under section 601(a) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"). The CARES Act established the Coronavirus Relief Fund (the "Fund") and appropriated \$150 billion to the Fund. Under the CARES Act, the Fund is to be used to make payments for specified uses to States and certain local governments; the District of Columbia and U.S. Territories (consisting of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands); and Tribal governments.

The CARES Act provides that payments from the Fund may only be used to cover costs that—

- 1. are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID–19);
- 2. were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 (the date of enactment of the CARES Act) for the State or government; and
- 3. were incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020, and ends on December 30, 2020.¹

The guidance that follows sets forth the Department of the Treasury's interpretation of these limitations on the permissible use of Fund payments.

Necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency

The requirement that expenditures be incurred "due to" the public health emergency means that expenditures must be used for actions taken to respond to the public health emergency. These may include expenditures incurred to allow the State, territorial, local, or Tribal government to respond directly to the emergency, such as by addressing medical or public health needs, as well as expenditures incurred to respond to second-order effects of the emergency, such as by providing economic support to those suffering from employment or business interruptions due to COVID-19-related business closures.

Funds may not be used to fill shortfalls in government revenue to cover expenditures that would not otherwise qualify under the statute. Although a broad range of uses is allowed, revenue replacement is not a permissible use of Fund payments.

The statute also specifies that expenditures using Fund payments must be "necessary." The Department of the Treasury understands this term broadly to mean that the expenditure is reasonably necessary for its intended use in the reasonable judgment of the government officials responsible for spending Fund payments.

Costs not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020

The CARES Act also requires that payments be used only to cover costs that were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020. A cost meets this requirement if either (a) the cost cannot lawfully be funded using a line item, allotment, or allocation within that budget *or* (b) the cost

¹ See Section 601(d) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the CARES Act.

is for a substantially different use from any expected use of funds in such a line item, allotment, or allocation.

The "most recently approved" budget refers to the enacted budget for the relevant fiscal period for the particular government, without taking into account subsequent supplemental appropriations enacted or other budgetary adjustments made by that government in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency. A cost is not considered to have been accounted for in a budget merely because it could be met using a budgetary stabilization fund, rainy day fund, or similar reserve account.

Costs incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020, and ends on December 30, 2020

A cost is "incurred" when the responsible unit of government has expended funds to cover the cost.

Nonexclusive examples of eligible expenditures

Eligible expenditures include, but are not limited to, payment for:

- 1. Medical expenses such as:
 - COVID-19-related expenses of public hospitals, clinics, and similar facilities.
 - Expenses of establishing temporary public medical facilities and other measures to increase COVID-19 treatment capacity, including related construction costs.
 - Costs of providing COVID-19 testing, including serological testing.
 - Emergency medical response expenses, including emergency medical transportation, related to COVID-19.
 - Expenses for establishing and operating public telemedicine capabilities for COVID-19related treatment.
- 2. Public health expenses such as:
 - Expenses for communication and enforcement by State, territorial, local, and Tribal governments of public health orders related to COVID-19.
 - Expenses for acquisition and distribution of medical and protective supplies, including
 sanitizing products and personal protective equipment, for medical personnel, police officers,
 social workers, child protection services, and child welfare officers, direct service providers
 for older adults and individuals with disabilities in community settings, and other public
 health or safety workers in connection with the COVID-19 public health emergency.
 - Expenses for disinfection of public areas and other facilities, *e.g.*, nursing homes, in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.
 - Expenses for technical assistance to local authorities or other entities on mitigation of COVID-19-related threats to public health and safety.
 - Expenses for public safety measures undertaken in response to COVID-19.
 - Expenses for quarantining individuals.
- 3. Payroll expenses for public safety, public health, health care, human services, and similar employees whose services are substantially dedicated to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

- 4. Expenses of actions to facilitate compliance with COVID-19-related public health measures, such as:
 - Expenses for food delivery to residents, including, for example, senior citizens and other vulnerable populations, to enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
 - Expenses to facilitate distance learning, including technological improvements, in connection with school closings to enable compliance with COVID-19 precautions.
 - Expenses to improve telework capabilities for public employees to enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
 - Expenses of providing paid sick and paid family and medical leave to public employees to enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
 - COVID-19-related expenses of maintaining state prisons and county jails, including as relates
 to sanitation and improvement of social distancing measures, to enable compliance with
 COVID-19 public health precautions.
 - Expenses for care for homeless populations provided to mitigate COVID-19 effects and enable compliance with COVID-19 public health precautions.
- 5. Expenses associated with the provision of economic support in connection with the COVID-19 public health emergency, such as:
 - Expenditures related to the provision of grants to small businesses to reimburse the costs of business interruption caused by required closures.
 - Expenditures related to a State, territorial, local, or Tribal government payroll support program.
 - Unemployment insurance costs related to the COVID-19 public health emergency if such
 costs will not be reimbursed by the federal government pursuant to the CARES Act or
 otherwise.
- 6. Any other COVID-19-related expenses reasonably necessary to the function of government that satisfy the Fund's eligibility criteria.

Nonexclusive examples of ineligible expenditures²

The following is a list of examples of costs that would *not* be eligible expenditures of payments from the Fund.

- 1. Expenses for the State share of Medicaid.³
- 2. Damages covered by insurance.
- 3. Payroll or benefits expenses for employees whose work duties are not substantially dedicated to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

² In addition, pursuant to section 5001(b) of the CARES Act, payments from the Fund may not be expended for an elective abortion or on research in which a human embryo is destroyed, discarded, or knowingly subjected to risk of injury or death. The prohibition on payment for abortions does not apply to an abortion if the pregnancy is the result of an act of rape or incest; or in the case where a woman suffers from a physical disorder, physical injury, or physical illness, including a life-endangering physical condition caused by or arising from the pregnancy itself, that would, as certified by a physician, place the woman in danger of death unless an abortion is performed. Furthermore, no government which receives payments from the Fund may discriminate against a health care entity on the basis that the entity does not provide, pay for, provide coverage of, or refer for abortions.

- 4. Expenses that have been or will be reimbursed under any federal program, such as the reimbursement by the federal government pursuant to the CARES Act of contributions by States to State unemployment funds.
- 5. Reimbursement to donors for donated items or services.
- 6. Workforce bonuses other than hazard pay or overtime.
- 7. Severance pay.
- 8. Legal settlements.

Staff Recommendation:

Recommend to City Council that the Truck Routes be changed due to designed standards of the streets.

Item Summary:

5th street was improved in 2017 and designed to replace the existing truck route. Because of safety concerns and increased deterioration of the existing truck route on 2nd street, truck traffic is being recommended to be rerouted to the properly designed infrastructure.

Background Information:

The item was brought to the Planning and Zoning Commission for consideration on September 3, 2020. At that meeting, following public comment, the Plan Commission voted to recommend designating a truck route in that area to run from the intersection of 2nd street and Terminal Street to 5th Street, and 5th Street to Hwy 1495. They also asked to have the speed limit on 5th street lowered to 15 mph.

Special Consideration:

In most cases order to reduce the designated speed on a local street, state law requires that a speed study be conducted and then limits the local jurisdiction from changing the speed limit based upon the findings of that study. Data was collected on traffic counts and speeds and submitted to Freese and Nichols for evaluation. Unfortunately based upon that the results the city can not currently lower the speed limit. Since receipt of the letter staff has asked that the current de facto speed limit of 30 MPH be posted, that police enforcement take place, that the truck route designation be implemented, and then data be collected and re-evaluated in 30 days to determine if reduction of speed can be justified.

Financial Impact: None

Board or 3rd Party recommendation:

Planning and Zoning commission voted to make the change along with the reduction of the speed limit on September 3, 2020.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-2615

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FREEPORT, TEXAS, CONTAINING A PREAMBLE; MAKING FINDINGS OF FACT AND DECLARING THE USE OF THE PUBLIC STREETS NOT THEREIN MENTIONED TO TRANSPORT BULK, FREIGHT AND HAZARDOUS MATERSIALS, AS THERE IN DEFINED, CONSTITUTES A PUBLIC NUISANCE; AMENDING TITLE VII OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF SAID CITY TO AMEND CHAPTER 76, PROVIDING THAT ANY PERSON VIOLATING SAID CODE, AS AMENDED BY THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE GUILTY OF A MISDEMEANOR AND ASSESSED A FINE IN ACCORDING WITH THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 10.99 OF SAID CODE OF ORDINANCES; CONTAINING SAVINGS CLAUSES; CONTAINING A SEVERANCE CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL TAKE EFFECT AND BE IN FORCE FROM AND AFTER IT DESCRIPTIVE CAPTION HAS BEEN PUBLISHED TWICE IN THE BRAZOSPORT FACTS.

WHEREAS, the City of Freeport, Texas, ("the City") is a "Home Rule City" and a "Home Rule Municipality" lying and situated in Brazoria County, Texas, as described in and defined by Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas and Section 1.005 of the Local Government Code of Texas, respectively; and,

WHEREAS, Sections 51.072, 54.001 54.004 and 217.042 of the Texas Local Government Code, authorize the City Council thereof to adopt the provisions of this Ordinance; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City has determined to here now declare that the adoption of this ordinance is necessary to the health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of said City and persons using the public streets of said city.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FREEPORT, TEXAS:

First, the City Council of the City finds that the transport-ation of bulk, freight and hazardous materials, as hereinafter defined, on the public streets of the City, other than the streets, or

portions thereof, hereinafter mentioned, constitutes a public nuisance which should be abated in the manner hereinafter provided.

Second, TITLE VII of the Code of Ordinances of the City is hereby amended to add thereto the following new chapter, to be known as Chapter 76, which shall read as follows:

"CHAPTER 76: TRANSPORTATION OF FREIGHT AND HAZARDOUS MATERIAL

Sec. 76.02 RESTRICTIONS ON TRANSPORTATION OF CARGO

- (C) The following streets, or indicated portions thereof, are authorized for the by-directional transportation of bulk, freight or hazardous materials, as designated:
- (1) Highway 332, within city limits: bulk, freight or hazardous materials.
- (2) Brazosport Boulevard (State Highway 288), within city limits: bulk, freight or hazardous materials.
- (3) Navigation Boulevard (FM 1495) between the south city limits and FM 523: bulk, freight or hazardous materials.
- (4) FM 523 from Navigation Boulevard (FM 1495) junction north to Highway 332: bulk, freight or hazardous materials.
- (5) Velasco Boulevard from FM 523 junction to South Avenue A: bulk or freight only.
- (6) South Avenue A, from Archer to Division Street: bulk or freight only.
- (7) Division Street, from South Avenue A to Gulf Boulevard: bulk or freight only.
- (8) Gulf Boulevard, from Brazosport Boulevard to Navigation Boulevard (FM 1495): bulk, freight or hazardous materials.
- (9) West 4th Street, from Brazosport Boulevard to Arbutus Street: bulk or freight only.
- (10) Arbutus Street, from West 4th Street to West 2nd Street: bulk or freight only
- (11) Oak Street, from West Brazos to West 4th Street: bulk or freight only.
- (12) West 4th Street, from Oak Street to Navigation Boulevard (FM 1495): bulk and freight only.
- (13) East 5th St. from Navigation Blvd. (FM1495) to Terminal St.; bulk, freight and hazardous materials.

- (14) Terminal St., from East 5th St. to East 2nd St. bulk, freight and hazardous materials.
- (15) East 2nd St., from Terminal St. to East Brazos St.: bulk, freight and hazardous materials.
- (16) East Brazos St., entire length: bulk, freight and hazardous materials.
- (17) West 8th Street, from Navigation Boulevard (FM 1495) to Cherry Street: bulk and freight only.
- (18) Cherry Street, from West 8th Street to Highway 36: bulk and freight only.
- (19) South Avenue D, from Velasco Boulevard to Navigation Boulevard (FM 1495): bulk and freight only.
- (20) Zapata Street, from Brazosport Boulevard to end of roadway: bulk and freight only.
- (21) Skinner Street, from Brazosport Boulevard to North Avenue J: bulk and freight only.
- (22) North Avenue J, from Skinner Street to Varner Street: bulk and freight only.
- (23) Varner Street, from North Avenue J to Brazosport Boulevard, bulk and freight only.
- (24) Victoria Street, from Brazosport Boulevard to end of roadway: bulk and freight only.
- (25) Archer Street, from South Avenue A to South Gulf Boulevard: bulk and freight only.
- (26) Sailfish, from Highway 332 to end of roadway: bulk and freight only.
- (27) Tarpon, from Sailfish to Marlin Avenue: bulk and freight only.
- (28) Marlin Avenue, from Tarpon to the end of the roadway: bulk and freight only.
- (29) Casco, from Highway 332 to end of roadway: bulk and freight only.

Fifth, this ordinance is cumulative of and in addition to all other ordinances of the City on the same subject and all such ordinances are hereby expressly saved from repeal. Provided however, where this ordinance and another ordinance conflict or overlap, whichever imposes the more stringent regulations or penalties, as the case may be, shall prevail.


Sixth, no offense committed and no fine, forfeiture or penalty incurred prior to the effective date hereof is to be affected by the adoption hereof but the punishment for any offense committed and the recovery of any fines or forfeitures incurred prior to such date shall take place as if this ordinance had not been adopted.

Seventh, if any section or provision hereof is found to be unconstitutional, void or inoperative by the final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, such defective provision, if any, is hereby declared to be severable from the remaining sections and provisions and such remaining sections and provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

Eighth, the City Manager shall cause signs giving notice of the fact and location of the truck routes established by this Ordinance to be posted at appropriate locations.

Ninth, this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the descriptive caption of this ordinance has been published twice in the Brazosport Facts, the official newspaper of the City.

1.00 PURPOSE AND NEED

1.01 EXCESSIVE TRAFFIC SPEEDS ON 5TH STREET

Traffic departing from FM 1495 (Pine Street), an arterial street with a posted speed limit of 35 MPH, uses 5th Street, a local street designated as a truck route to access between Pine Street and Terminal Street. Speeds are not posted on 5th Street. Even though it is a truck route, being classified as a local street in Freeport, the street would have a default (defacto) speed



limit of 30 MPH. According to speed measurements by the City, vehicles travel at over 40 MPH, with an 85th percentile speed of 46 MPH eastbound from Pine Street and 42 MPH westbound toward Pine Street.

1.02 DESIRED TRAFFIC SPEEDS ON 5TH STREET

It is desired by the residents living along this section of 5th Street that traffic operates at speeds appropriate for the local street classification and emerging development along 5th Street.

2.00 TRAFFIC SPEED MITIGATION RECOMMENDATION

2.01 INITIAL SPEED MITIGATION TREATMENT.

As an initial treatment, install speed limit regulatory signs to post the speed limit as 30 MPH. Since this is the defacto speed limit, no supporting actions are necessary to post the speed limit signs. The signs should be posted at the following locations:

- 1. Eastbound, mid-block of each of the first two blocks after Pine Street (2 signs)
- 2. Westbound, mid-block of each of the first two blocks after Terminal Street (2 signs)

2.02 MONITOR TRAFFIC SPEEDS

If possible, conduct "before and after" speed measurements to assess the effectiveness of the speed limit signage. Assess the need for additional speed mitigation measures.

Background Information:

This recommendation comes following careful consideration by staff and council, and with input from the public. The list proposed has changed a little from what was presented at the meeting on October 26th. In addition to those streets proposed for asphalt by the county at the meeting we are recommending the addition of Jones Rd., from Yellowstone to Victoria. We are also recommending that Hickory, Mesquite and the 3 alleys be included in this work. All streets recommended, except the 3 alleys, are currently asphalt, and would remain asphalt streets. If approved, staff would begin immediately to replace curb and gutter on Hickory and Mesquite, and work with Veolia to make any needed water and sewer main improvements prior to the County work being started.

Special Considerations

In addition to these proposed streets moving forward with asphalt rehab under the County interlocal agreement, if approved, staff plans to present a task authorization for council consideration in the near future for Freese and Nichols to begin working on engineering to bid out the following <u>concrete</u> streets. These streets include some of those proposed on October 26th, including: <u>West 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th Streets, plus Avalon, Lynn and Arbutus Streets.</u> These concrete streets will be proposed for rehab this year.

As a result of the meeting on the 26th additional streets have been identified and planned for improvement. For *next year*, we would be proposing the following asphalt streets be rehabbed under the County Interlocal Contract: <u>South Avenues B, F, and G as well as, sections of Brit Baily, Zapata, Skinner and Travis Streets.</u>

Also, for fiscal year 2021/22 we would proposed <u>concrete work on Avenue A</u> from Division to Velasco.

Finally, in FY22/23 we would propose concrete replacement of 10th, 11th and 12th streets.

All the proposed streets planned have been depicted on the attached map showing fiscal year and material (Asphalt vs. Concrete)

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends approving this Resolution.

Item Summary:

This Resolution adopts revisions to the Education Pay Policy [Section 9.16] and Certification Pay Policy [Section 9.17] in Chapter Nine of the Freeport Personnel Policy Handbook. The current policy effective October 1, 2020, states that the maximum combined pay for Education and Certification is \$5,000.00. Staff recommends adding a clause to grandfather employees whose combined Education and Certification pay was above the \$5,000.00 maximum before Oct. 1, 2020. The proposed grandfather clause is:

"Employees with existing Education and Certification pay above this maximum before Oct. 01, 2020 will be grandfathered at their existing higher total annual amount, if all educational and certification qualifications are maintained."

Recommended changes to policy include restating the paragraphs regarding the maximum combined pay to read as follows:

1. Section 9.16 Education Pay:

"In combination with Certification Pay in Section 9.17 the maximum combined pay for Education and Certification is \$5,000.00. Employees with existing Education and Certification pay above this maximum before Oct. 1, 2020 will be grandfathered at their existing higher total annual amount, if all educational and certification qualifications are maintained."

2. Section 9.17 Certification Pay:

"In combination with Education Pay in Section 9.16 the maximum combined pay for Education and Certification is \$5,000.00. Employees with existing Education and Certification pay above this maximum before Oct. 1, 2020 will be grandfathered at their

existing higher total annual amount, if all educational and certification qualifications are maintained."

Background Information:

These proposed revisions are updates to changes that were adopted on September 8, 2020, with other revision to Chapter 9 in our Personnel Policy Handbook. These revisions reflect subsequent employee feedback to the extent practicable.

The rationale for the maximum combined Education plus Certification Pay provision is these qualifications may be justifiable minimum requirements in job descriptions for some positions, and therefore would be compensated via the established base salary levels. However, we do not want to penalize employees who had already earned credentials prior to the policy change effective October 1, 2020.

Financial Impacts:

Grandfathering existing employees with Education and Certification Pay above the maximum total of \$5,000 annually has no additional financial impact to the City because these amounts are already being paid and were included in the FY2020-2021 Budget. There are five (5) employees across two (2) departments who are currently over the \$5k maximum.

That the City Council of the City hereby approves and adopts revisions to the Education Pay policy, attached hereto in Exhibit "A" and approves its revision to the Personnel Policy Handbook as section 9.16, a permanent personnel policy of the City, which shall take effect on Nov. 2, 2020.

SECTION 9.17 CERTIFICATION PAY. That the City Council of the City hereby approves and adopts revisions to the Certification Pay policy, attached hereto in Exhibit "A" and approves its revision to the Personnel Policy Handbook as section 9.17, a permanent personnel policy of the City, which shall take effect on November 2, 2020.

EMPLOYEE WAGE AND BENEFITS

9.16 Education Pay - ADOPTED 09/08/2020 and Updated 11/02/2020

The City of Freeport provides education pay for all full-time employees in recognition of the highest degree earned according to the following schedule:

DEGREE	YEARLY	PER PAY PERIOD
Associate Degree	600.00	23.08
Bachelor Degree	1,500.00	57.70
Master Degree	2,500.00	96.16

All education pay is calculated based on the highest education level achieved (not multiple levels). In combination with Certification Pay in Section 9.17 the maximum combined pay for Education and Certification is \$ 5,000.00. Employees with existing Education and Certification pay above this maximum before October 01, 2020 will be grandfathered at their existing higher total annual amount, if all educational and certification qualifications are maintained.

Effective fiscal year 2020-2021 (Oct. 1, 2020) all education is paid-out on a per pay period basis, not annually. The per pay period calculation is the highest education pay level earned divided by 26 pay periods. In order to receive Education, pay, appropriate documents (official certified transcript) must be on file in the Human Resource Department. Pay begins in the pay period following receipt of certified transcripts in HR. Education Pay is not retroactive. Because education pay is paid-out to active employees on a per pay period basis, no additional education pay is issued upon separation of employment.

These education benefits apply to qualifications above and beyond the minimum requirements stated in job descriptions.

9.17 Certification Pay - ADOPTED 09/08/2020 and Updated 11/02/2020

Effective fiscal year 2020-2021 (Oct. 1, 2020) all certification pay is paid-out on a per pay period basis, not annually. Written proof of certification is required. Pay begins in the pay period following receipt of official certificate in HR. Certification Pay is not retroactive. Because certification pay is paid-out to active employees on a per pay period basis, no additional education pay is issued upon separation of employment.
